
Lent 2016: with Mary in the Year of Mercy RICH IN MERCY, RICH IN MUSIC

Misericordiae Vultus - The Face of Mercy



1. Jesus Christ is the face of the Father's mercy. The Father, "rich in mercy" (*Eph* 2:4), after having revealed his name to Moses as "a God merciful and gracious, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love and faithfulness" (*Ex* 34:6), has never ceased to show, in various ways throughout history, his divine nature. Whoever sees Jesus sees the Father (cf. *Jn* 14:9). Jesus of Nazareth, by his words, his actions, and his entire person reveals the mercy of God.

2. Mercy: the ultimate and supreme act by which God comes to meet us. Mercy: the fundamental law that dwells in the heart of every person who looks sincerely into the eyes of his brothers and sisters on the path of life. Mercy: the bridge that connects God and man, opening our hearts to the hope of being loved forever despite our sinfulness.

3. And so he turned his gaze to Mary, holy and immaculate in love (cf. *Eph* 1:4), choosing her to be the Mother of man's Redeemer. (Mother of Mercy!)When faced with the gravity of sin, God responds with the fullness of mercy.

4. Recall the words of Saint John XXIII when, opening the Council, he indicated the path to follow:

- We shall cross the threshold of the Holy Door fully confident that the strength of the Risen Lord, who

constantly supports us on our pilgrim way, will sustain us.

6. God's mercy, rather than a sign of weakness, is the mark of his omnipotence.

- "Patient and merciful." These words often go together in the Old Testament to describe God's nature.

- "he crowns you with steadfast love and mercy" (*Ps*103:3-4).

7. "For his mercy endures forever." This is the refrain that repeats after each verse in Psalm 136 as it narrates the history of God's revelation.

Dust in the wind (Kansas)

I close my eyes only for a moment, and the moment's gone All my dreams pass before my eyes, a curiosity Dust in the wind, all they are is dust in the wind Now, don't hang on, nothing lasts forever but the earth and sky It slips away, and all your money won't another minute buy Dust in the wind, all we are is dust in the wind

8. "God is love" (1 Jn 4:8,16), John affirms for the first and only time in all of Holy Scripture. This love has now been made visible and tangible in Jesus' entire life. His person is nothing but love, a love given gratuitously. The relationships he forms with the people who approach him manifest something entirely unique and unrepeatable. The signs he works, especially in favour of sinners, the poor, the marginalized, the sick, and the suffering, are all meant to teach mercy. Everything in him speaks of mercy. Nothing in him is devoid of compassion.

There is only Christ. He is everything. He is in everything. (Ford, 1975)

After freeing the demoniac in the country of the Gerasenes, Jesus entrusted him with this mission: "Go home to your friends, and tell them how much the Lord has done for you, and how he has had mercy on you" (*Mk* 5:19). Saint Bede the Venerable, commenting on this Gospel passage, wrote that Jesus looked upon Matthew with merciful love and chose him: *miserando atque eligendo*. This expression impressed me so much that I chose it for my episcopal motto.

- Lowly but chosen / By having mercy, by choosing him (Latin) / Mercifying (Pope's word) and Choosing

- Describes the vision of Jesus / Who gives gift of Mercy and chooses and takes unto himself

9. In the parables devoted to mercy: lost sheep, lost coin and father with 2 sons. In these parables, God is always presented as full of joy, especially when he pardons. In them we find the core of the Gospel and of our faith, because mercy is presented as a force that overcomes everything, filling the heart with love and bringing consolation through pardon.

> Father, Mercy by Bob Dufford, SJ Father Mercy; Father, hear me. Why have you gone form me? Broken, humbled, waiting, hopeful, Father return to me.

Another parable: "Should not you have had mercy on your fellow servant, as I had mercy on you?" (Mt 18:33). Jesus concludes, "So also my heavenly Father will do to every one of you, if you do not forgive your brother from your heart" (Mt 18:35).



In short, we are called to show mercy because mercy has first been shown to us. Pardoning offences becomes the clearest expression of merciful love, and for us Christians it is an imperative from which we cannot excuse ourselves. At times how hard it seems to forgive! And yet pardon is the instrument placed into our fragile hands to attain serenity of heart. To let go of anger, wrath, violence, and revenge are necessary conditions to living joyfully. Let us therefore heed the Apostle's exhortation: "Do not let the sun go down on your anger" YEAR OF (Eph4:26). Above all, let us listen to the words of Jesus who made mercy an ideal of life and a **MERCY** criterion for the credibility of our faith: "Blessed are the merciful, for they shall obtain mercy"

(*Mt* 5:7): the beatitude to which we should particularly aspire in this Holy Year.

10. However, without a witness to mercy, life becomes fruitless and sterile, as if sequestered in a barren desert. The time has come for the Church to take up the joyful call to mercy once more. It is time to return to the basics and to bear the weaknesses and struggles of our brothers and sisters. Mercy is the force that reawakens us to new life and instils in us the courage to look to the future with hope.

12. It is absolutely essential for the Church and for the credibility of her message that she herself live and testify to mercy. Her language and her gestures must transmit mercy, so as to touch the hearts of all people and inspire them once more to find the road that leads to the Father.

City of God (Dan Schutte)

Let us build a city of God. May our tears be turned into dancing. For the Lord our light and our love. Has turned the night into day.

In our parishes, communities, associations and movements, in a word, wherever there are Christians, everyone should find an oasis of mercy.

13. We want to live this Jubilee Year in light of the Lord's words: *Merciful like the Father*. The Evangelist reminds us of the teaching of Jesus who says, "Be merciful just as your Father is merciful" (*Lk* 6:36). In order to be capable of mercy, therefore, we must first of all dispose ourselves to listen to the Word of God. This means rediscovering the value of silence in order to meditate on the Word that comes to us. In this way, it will be possible to contemplate God's mercy and adopt it as our lifestyle.

14. The practice of *pilgrimage* has a special place in the Holy Year, because it represents the journey each of us makes in this life. Life itself is a pilgrimage, and the human being is a *viator*, a pilgrim travelling along the road, making his way to the desired destination. Similarly, to reach the Holy Door in Rome or in any other place in the world, everyone, each according to his or her ability, will have to make a pilgrimage. This will be a sign that mercy is also a goal to reach and requires dedication and sacrifice. May pilgrimage be an impetus to conversion: by crossing

the threshold of the Holy Door, we will find the strength to embrace God's mercy and dedicate ourselves to being merciful with others as the Father has been with us.

Turn (Ford, 1997, from the play ACTS)

I'm on a journey, searching for the answers, to the questions that fill my life.

Where did my love go, how can my friends know? I'm reaching out and no one is there to help me so. Turn - Turn

Goals: Judge not; forgive and to give; *Merciful like the Father*, therefore, is the "motto" of this Holy Year. In mercy, we find proof of how God loves us.

15. It is my burning desire that, during this Jubilee, the Christian people may reflect on the *corporal and spiritual works of mercy*. It will be a way to reawaken our conscience, too often grown dull in the face of poverty. And let us enter more deeply into the heart of the Gospel where the poor have a special experience of God's mercy.

16. May the words of the Apostle accompany us: he who does acts of mercy, let him do them with cheerfulness (cf. Rom 12:8).
 Happy Together by the Turtles

 Imagine me and you, I do. I think about you day and night. It's only right.
 To think about the God you love. And hold God tight. So happy together
 I can't see me lovin' nobody but you for all my life.
 When you're with me, Oh God, the skies will be blue for all my life.

17. The season of Lent during this Jubilee Year should also be lived more intensely as a privileged moment to celebrate and experience God's mercy.

- Micah: "You, O Lord, are a God who takes away iniquity and pardons sin, who does not hold your anger forever, but are pleased to show mercy." (cf. 7:18-19)

Ashes by Tom Conroy We rise again from ashes, from the good we've failed to do. We rise again from ashes, to create ourselves anew. If all our world is ashes, then must our lives be true, an offering of ashes, an offering to you.

- Isaiah: "Then shall your light break forth like the dawn...if you pour yourself out for the hungry and satisfy the desire of the afflicted, then shall your light rise in the darkness and your gloom be as the noonday" (58:6-11).

A time will come for singing by Dan Schutte, 1977

A time will come for singing when all your tears are shed, when sorrows chains are broken, and broken hearts will mend. The deaf will hear your singing when silent tongues are freed. The lame will join your dancing when blind eyes learn to see. A time will come for singing when trees will raise their boughs, when all lay down their armor and hammer their swords into plows, when beggars live as princes, and orphans find their homes, when prison cells are emptied and hatred has grown old.

Let us place the Sacrament of Reconciliation at the centre once more in such a way that it will enable people to touch the grandeur of God's mercy with their own hands. In short, confessors are called to be a sign of the primacy of mercy always, everywhere, and in every situation, no matter what.

18. *Missionaries of Mercy*. They will be, above all, living signs of the Father's readiness to welcome those in search of his pardon.

One Love, One heart. Let's get together and it will be alright. (Bob Marley, 1965)

19. This is the opportune moment to change our lives! This is the time to allow our hearts to be touched! When faced with evil deeds, even in the face of serious crimes, it is the time to listen to the cry of innocent people who are deprived of their property, their dignity, their feelings, and even their very lives.

The Lord hears the cry of the poor. Blessed by the Lord. (John Foley, SJ, 1978)

20. The relationship between *justice* and *mercy*. In Sacred Scripture, justice is conceived essentially as the faithful abandonment of oneself to God's will. 'I desire mercy not sacrifice'. (*Mt* 9:13) "I desire love and not sacrifice" (Hosea 6:6) Jesus is bent on revealing the great gift of mercy that searches out sinners and offers them pardon and salvation. God's justice is his mercy (cf. *Ps* 51:11-16).

22. Let us live this Jubilee intensely, begging the Father to forgive our sins and to bathe us in his merciful "indulgence."

23. Among the privileged names that Islam attributes to the Creator are "Merciful and Kind". This invocation is often on the lips of faithful Muslims who feel themselves accompanied and sustained by mercy in their daily weakness. I trust that this Jubilee year celebrating the mercy of God will foster an encounter with these religions and with other noble religious traditions; may it open us to even more fervent dialogue so that we might know and understand one another better; may it eliminate every form of closedmindedness and disrespect, and drive out every form of violence and discrimination. Everyday People (Sly and the family Stone, 1968) Sometimes I'm right and I can be wrong. My own beliefs are in my song The butcher, the banker, the drummer and then. Makes no difference what group I'm in I am everyday people, yeah yeah There is a yellow one that won't accept the black one That won't accept the red one that won't accept the white one And different strokes for different folks And so on and so on and scooby dooby doo. 24. My thoughts now turn to the Mother of Mercy. Her entire life was patterned after the presence of mercy made flesh. The Mother of the Crucified and Risen One has entered the sanctuary of divine mercy because she participated intimately in the mystery of His love. Her hymn of praise was dedicated to the mercy of God which extends from "generation to generation" (*Lk* 1:50). We too were included in those prophetic words of the Virgin Mary.


Let it Be (Beatles)

25. I present, therefore, this Extraordinary Jubilee Year dedicated to living out in our daily lives the mercy which the Father constantly extends to all of us. In this Jubilee Year, let us allow God to surprise us. Church's life is authentic and credible only when she becomes a convincing herald of mercy.

The Church is called above all to be a credible witness to mercy, professing it and living it as the core of the revelation of Jesus Christ.

From the heart of the Trinity, from the depths of the mystery of God, the great river of mercy wells up and overflows unceasingly.

In this Jubilee Year, may the Church echo the word of God that resounds strong and clear as a message and a sign of pardon, strength, aid, and love. May she never tire of extending mercy, and be ever patient in offering compassion and comfort. May the Church become the voice of every man and woman, and repeat confidently without end: "Be mindful of your mercy, O Lord, and your steadfast love, for they have been from of old" (*Ps* 25:6).
